Instead of constructing complex, all-encompassing theories of preference change, the authors of this volume start with very simple, formal accounts of some possible and hopefully plausible mechanism of preference change. Eventually, these models may find their way into larger, empirically adequate theories, but at this stage, we think that the most important work lies in building structure. Secondly, we stress the importance of interdisciplinary exchange. For one has not only to make a distinction between his reputation during his life and after his premature death in 1943, but also between his reputation as a philosopher and as an archaeologist and historian. Collingwood himself considered philosophy as his primary occupation and his work in archaeology and history as that of an amateur.
